MSCC to Name Meeting Rooms in Memory of Mary and John Wilson



Message from the Foundation Chair

Good news continues to abound at Mid-South Community College, and the future of higher education in our

region looks brighter than ever.

Among the good news is another enrollment increase for the fall semester. MSCC's headcount surpassed 1,600 for the first time as the college experienced 4.9 percent growth. That number is encouraging for a variety of reasons, not the least of which is the understanding that more of our citizens are taking advantage of high-quality, relevant educational opportunities in Crittenden County.

We have also experienced growth in the fund-raising area as more people are making significant contributions to the MSCC Foundation. Participation in Foundation-related activities has also increased, and we are hoping that translates into an even broader base of donors in the years to come. I am excited that 100 percent of our Foundation Board members are contributing at some level this year, and we believe that sets an example that others will want to follow. MSCC employees are also participating at a higher level this year, and we are thankful for that.

The new Information Technology/ADTEC University Center is nearing completion, and that will begin another new chapter in the great story of MSCC. The IT building will allow the college to offer enhanced learning services, and the University Center will create a whole new set of opportunities for people in our region. With everything going so well, the temptation might be to ease up on the gas pedal and coast a little, but this is no time to rest on our laurels. Momentum is on our side; let's keep it going.

New Southland Park Scholarships at MSCC—Southland Park Gaming and Racing recently announced a \$25,000 grant to the Mid-South Community College Foundation to establish a scholarship program for West Memphis residents and Southland employees. The program will assist high school graduates and GED candidates and will provide financial assistance for students needing remedial and writing classes. Southland also awarded \$10,000 to MSCC for equipment that will facilitate enhanced emergency medical technician training at the college. The company announced a total of 30 grants, with a value of \$170,000, during its first biannual funding awards ceremony in September.
